COY'S DIGGINGS. [FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT]

Since the melancholy and fatal accident that befell the two unfortunate men Blann and Motton, there appears to be a gloom cast over the place.

The funeral took place last Monday, and their remains were followed to their final resting place, the Whroo Cemetery, by nearly all the inhabitants of Coy's in token of respect to our late fellow townsmen, who were well known and esteemed by us.

Two men in the vigor of manhood taken from a small community like ours, without a moments warning, shows to us plainly the uncertainty of life. Men to whom I was talking on the morning of the accident, in three short hours to see them cold in death, is rather saddening and oppressive; let us hope it will be a warning to the miners of the place to use every caution in future.

On Saturday two men named Motton and Blann, who had taken a contract to sink a shaft 150 deep on the London reef, at Coy's Diggings, while putting in the last slabs close to the surface, met with an accident which resulted in the death of both of them.

Blann, who was on the stage which was supported by two bars of iron, one of which was not thicker than the handle of a riding whip, had put in one of the slabs which appeared to Mutton, who was on the surface, to be a little out of place, and in his hurry to alter it, he jumped upon the staging thinking it was strong enough to carry both, but his extra weight caused the weak iron to bend and loose its hold on the sides of the shaft, causing one end of the stage to [illegible] down the shaft; seeing their danger, they threw themselves backwards to endeavour to catch hold of the partition which divides the shaft into two, but missing the edge they were both precipitated to the bottom, both being instantly killed.

Blann met with his death exactly 12 months from the day he was married, and leaves a wife and child, and Motton a wife to mourn his loss.

MAGISTERIAL INQUIRY. COY'S DIGGINGS. May 23rd, 1870.

Magisterial inquiry made before me at Coy's Diggings, on Monday 23rd day of May, 1870, on the bodies of Charles Blann and Henry Motton.

Frederick Tilson, on oath saith on Saturday the 21st inst, at 12 o'clock, I was on the top of the shaft when I observed Henry Motton stepping on the stage which immediately went down the shaft, Charles Blann was on the stage at the time, and went down also, the depth of the shaft is 150 feet, I called at once for assistance, several people came and William Merryfull went down to the bottom of the shaft and found them both dead and at once brought the two bodies to the surface. The Dr Heily was sent for who came shortly after the accident had happened.

Charles Blann is my brother-in-law. Both bodies are removed to the London Tavern Hotel, for Magisterial inquiry, I identify them as the bodies of Charles Blann and Henry Motton.

William Merryfull, miner, on oath, saith about 12 o'clock on Saturday last, the 21st inst, I was standing about 120 yards from the London Reef shaft, I heard some person calling out, I ran at once to see what it was, upon my arrival at the shaft Frederick Tilson informed me that the stage connected with said shaft and that the deceased Charles Blann and Henry Motton had gone down with it, I immediately went down the shaft and found them both at the bottom dead, I brought both the bodies to the surface at once, and I identify the bodies

now at the London Tavern Hotel as the bodies of Charles Blann and Henry Motton.

WILLIAM MERRYFULL.

I find by the evidence given that Charles Blann and Henry Motton, came by their death on Saturday the 21st inst., accidentally, through the breaking of the stage of the shaft of the London Reef, Coy's Diggings which fell down with them 150 feet.
